

ALCOHOL & SMOKING

Federal law does not allow the consumption of alcohol for anyone under 21 years of age. To get a drink, you must produce a VALID driver's license, state ID, or military ID with your picture on it to prove that you are at least 21 years of age. Attempting to drink while under 21 years of age or knowingly serving alcohol to someone under 21 years of age is a violation of the law and LibertyCon's Code of Conduct and could subject you to ejection from LibertyCon.

Tennessee state law does not allow smoking in any enclosed public places, including hotels, restaurants, or the Convention Center.

ATTIRE

LibertyCon loves costumes! However, we are a family-friendly convention. Please dress and costume appropriately.

AGE RESTRICTIONS

All convention attendees who are 17 years of age or younger must be accompanied by a guardian. Minors under 7 years of age must always be accompanied by a guardian.

BADGES

Badges must always be worn in plain sight. If you lose your badge at the convention, you will have to purchase another badge at the full admission price before being allowed to participate in further convention activities.

WFAPONS POLICY

All weapons or items which may be mistaken for a weapon, except for knives with a blade length of 4 inches or less, must be peace bonded by LibertyCon Security before they may be worn. This weapons policy will be strictly enforced.

ROOM PARTIES

Room parties are not official LibertyCon events but we encourage them. If your party is approved by Brandy, in a hotel room on the Party Floor, and with the door open, then the expectation is that the party is open to all LibertyCon attendees. If your party is intended to be private, please keep your door shut so misunderstandings don't occur. Hosts are required to card anyone who wishes to drink at their event and must follow the rules outlined in the Alcohol & Smoking section. LibertyCon does not and will not assume any responsibility to check badges for any type of party.

PRIVACY. PHOTOGRAPHY. AND ELECTRONIC RECORDING

LibertyCon members should be aware that photographs, video, and audio recordings occur during the convention, and that their likenesses may appear in these recordings. Attendees and members agree to assign without compensation the use of their likenesses for the use of promotional material.

Members of the press are welcome at all events. All journalists, media photographers, and any other members of the press are required to display an official LibertyCon Press Badge or always be accompanied by a LibertyCon staff member.

Members should be polite and ask before taking photographs or recordings of members and attendees whenever possible. Photography and audio/video recordings for personal archival use are generally acceptable. If an individual makes it clear that they do not wish to be photographed or recorded, doing so may be considered harassment. **Cosplay** IS NOT **consent.**

The usage of photographic or recording devices is prohibited in certain areas of the convention including the Art Show and Charity Auction. Where allowed, please take photographs before or after a program event to avoid distracting panelists and audience members to the maximum extent possible.

PFTS

Pets are not allowed in convention function spaces. Fully trained service animals, however, are always welcome.

GRILLS & OUTDOOR COOKING

No outdoor cooking or open flame grills are allowed on the hotel premises.

EJECTION FROM THE CONVENTION


If you are ejected from LibertyCon because of a violation of the convention rules or Tennessee State Law, then your attendance fees will not be refunded.

Larry Correia is a Dragon Award winning, New York Times Bestselling author. He has written 25 books and is best known for his Monster Hunter series, the Grimnoir Chronicles, the Saga of the Forgotten Warrior, and In Defense of the Second Amendment, his first and only nonfiction title. He has written two collections of short storie, and has co-edited four more. Before he was a full-time writer, he had been a



dairy farmer, a firearms instructor, and a military contract accountant.

In his free time, he enjoys painting minis, shooting guns, and playing games with his friends and family. On nice, sunny days, he can be found on the back porch watching over Yard Moose Mountain, with his wife, the Lovely Mrs. Correia, who is the one people really come to see.

Correia has four children, one of whom is an author, and she learned almost everything she knows from him. Some of her fondest memories are going on long car rides, telling him about whatever she was working on at the time, and talking about storytelling for hours. Without him, she would not have nearly the fondness of writing that she does now. He is always encouraging of not just her, but all young artists, and his responses to story ideas are almost always "That sounds awesome! You should do it!"

Artist Guest of Honor

David Mattingly

David Mattingly's home page identifies him as "artist, teacher, matte painter." And he is indeed all those things, and more. You'll find some of the many, many works he's done for Baen Books front and center on that page, with Honor Harrington enjoying a place of ... honor. But there are wizards, robots, wolves with guns, Vincent Price, and Mattingly himself firing a blaster enthusiastically. And probably an Orson, too, though you'll have to look for the cat who appeared on many a cover over the years, mostly covertly, as is only fitting for a cat.



Mattingly has been a partner in the fun and joie de vivre of Baen illustration from the very beginning of Baen, back in 1984: Our first sell piece featured a centaur, a horn, and an amazing starscape. His work has graced numerous *New York Times* bestselling books, including many Honor Harrington series titles, and he's illustrated everyone from Edgar Rice Burroughs (reprints—he's not *that* old) to Martin Caidin and Timothy Zahn. He's worked for every mainline publisher in New York and has over 2,000 book covers to his credit. Not a typo: 2000!

But even if you haven't seen one of his covers (you have), his work will be familiar to you. He began his career at Walt Disney studios, nominative determinism being a real thing, drawing matte paintings for the movies. His work graced such features as *The Black Hole, Tron, Dick Tracy* and *I, Robot* for Weta Digital, and he rose to head the matte department at Disney before he left. It is no exaggeration to say that he is one of those artists whose vision have shaped what our modern conception of "science fiction and fantasy" is.

Mattingly is a man who is not content to rest on his laurels (and he's won numerous industry awards for his illustrations, too). I've known him to always be experimenting with different ways of approaching covers, including exploring 3D printing and computer animation. And because he's that kind of person, he shares what he learns: he's been now for many years a teacher at the School of Visual Arts and the Pratt Institute in New York City. And he's on-line, as well, at Lynda.com, if you are interested in learning from him. And check out his book of instruction, *The Digital Matte Painting Handbook*, and his book of art, *Alternate Views, Alternate Universes*, unfortunately both out of print, but available as used copies.

My experience as an art director with David has always been one of choosing between an embarrassment of riches when he gives me sketches for a project. A real triumph for me, though, was in identifying David as the Honor Harrington series cover artist (and Jim Baen immediately agreeing). As some readers may recall, we tried a number of artists for the first five Honor covers before settling on David—and that was because I'd seen a sketch he'd done for another series that, with some judicious change of models, would work just great for Honor. And we have never looked back, Honor's beret and all!

He and his wife, Cathe Cogswell (a name well known in science fiction literary history), are wonderful mentors to David's students, and also wonderful hosts to visiting firemen in New York, and always up to exploring new foodie opportunities. I hope they'll enjoy Chattanooga's offerings, and I know that you'll enjoy your Artist Guest of Honor!

Oh, and I hope you picked up your LibertyCon T-shirt, because it's got beautiful David Mattingly art on it this year! Also, check out his table in the dealer's room!

Doctor Travis Taylor

I've known Travis—"Doc" or "Doc Taylor" to most folks—for quite some few



years now. My late husband Darrell knew him first, and introduced us when I decided to try my hand at writing a book. Travis took me under his wing and mentored me through the whole thing, including constructive critique of the first draft, talking me out of trashing it when the plot happened in real life and killed a friend, polishing, and finding a publisher. During that whole process, we became good friends.

The most fun I have EVER had writing a book was when he and I coauthored *Extraction Point!* The concepts of that book evoked our shared interests in several ideas, and while he traveled a lot on business, we still managed to find time to brainstorm and write together. He'd call me from the gate at his flight layover, and say, "Steph! I had an idea for the book, and wanted to run it by you!" Next thing I knew, I was grabbing my laptop and typing notes directly into the manuscript as we came up with wording, dialogue and actions! Sometimes we'd write entire scenes that way, over the phone! We'd brainstorm and talk and write until he was literally walking into the skybridge and my phone was threatening to shut down with a dead battery! Over and over and over. And when I'd written all I could think of for the moment, I'd hand off the manuscript to him, and he'd go over what I'd written and pick up where I'd left off, write until he couldn't think of more, and hand it back to me. Back and forth. And it was seamless.

Of course, we've both used each other as characters in stories. That's fun, 'cause you know the person, and you know what they'd do and say, and sometimes you surprise 'em. I wasn't expecting to ever be the heroine of his story, but he saw me in that role. Means a lot to me.

Travis is brilliant, of course, and really awfully [expletive redacted] good at the stuff he does, whether it's high-level engineering/science, writing novels, writing popular science, or hosting/guesting on TV shows about science- and engineering-based concepts. (Sitting back and watching—sometimes even helping—behind the scenes during filming is almost as much fun as coauthoring a book with him.) He has an ability that is all too rare among scientists and engineers: the ability to break down the most abstruse scientific concept into something that is easily understood by non-scientists. That comes across in his writing, his TV appearances, and his public appearances.

Which is how I know that his stint this year as LibertyCon's STEM Guest of Honor is gonna be fun!

At around the half-hour mark of this animated discussion, Terry Maggert and I caught our breaths, both oblivious to the rolling eyes of the convention crowd ambling around us. We had, after all, just met—introduced by my wife Leia after Terry had giddily gushed over one of her stained glass Pteranodons. Where had this guy been all my life?



Over lunch, I swiftly learned there was more to Terry than our mutual ardent appreciation of prehistoric flapping lizards. Much more.

A self-described rabid reader, Terry's an ardent admirer of Anne McCaffrey, Ernest Hemingway, and Robert Frost, among many others. In addition to his scholarly background as a history professor, Terry had found his true calling as the author of over thirty science fiction and dark fantasy novels. These include dystopian science fiction, paranormal urban fantasy, young adult paranormal fantasy, tales of time travel, and sword and sorcery.

And, yes, between the pages of some of his books, there be dragons.

Although Terry clearly, even boyishly, enjoys himself at the keyboard, he's an unpretentious working writer who treats his schedule with the professional discipline of any other serious job. He compares proofing and editing his books, something many authors consider tedious at best, to "being able to take back the dumb things you've said." Would that we could all do that in so-called real life.

He finds villains delicious to write, reveling in their glorious insults, while noting that pride is always their downfall. Well, almost always. His favorite kind of scene to write is between two people, together in a room, having an uncomfortably honest conversation. Terry likes to approach each book he writes with musings, like "Do Vikings like jokes? What kind of dog would be friends with a ghost? What would happen if a demon went to the beach?"

Also, Terry's a dedicated rescue animals advocate. He bakes and drinks disturbingly copious amounts of coffee. Oh, and he longs to visit Africa to have breakfast with giraffes. When you're looking for a good book to escape into or need a qualified forklift operator, Terry's the guy for you.

So, the next time you see Terry Maggert at a convention, ask him about where his ideas come from, or about pterodactyls, or the time we were nearly struck by lightning in a restaurant parking lot, or even ask him if Jesus was a strict vegetarian. He has the answers.

But don't get him started on his loathing of butter beans. You'll never hear the end of it.

35th Anniversary Literary Guest

Timothy Zahn

Tim Zahn is a year older than I am. Yes, he's *that* old. But he's also sort of like a fine wine that improves with age.

And he got off to a pretty rousing start to be improving from, to be honest.

I first met Tim's writing way back in 1987, when I picked up a short story named "Cascade Point" by this guy named "Zahn," who I'd never before heard of at that point. I thought then that it was one of the best pieces of short fiction I'd ever read, and nothing has happened in the interim to change my opinion of it. I have, however, met Tim in the flesh, now, and he has been a very substantial contributor to my Honorverse stories, both as a writer of short fiction and as a collaborator with me and Tom Pope on the Manticore Ascendant series.

I wanted Tim as a collaborator for a lot of reasons. One is that I like him a lot, on a personal level. In fact, Sharon and I count him and Anna among our personal friends, because they're just such darned nice



people. I also wanted Tim as a collaborator because I didn't want to write those novels solo. I wanted them to have a significantly different "flavor" from the novels of Honor Harrington's time since they were happening several hundred years earlier. So, I was looking for someone whose storytelling style was different from mine, whose writing ability I deeply respected, and who I could inveigle into writing those books for the Honorverse. And I wanted him because he'd already made a not insignificant contribution to the Honorverse "canon" in the short fiction he'd contributed to the anthologies. It was what's known as a "win-win" situation, from my perspective, and I'm really pleased with how those books worked out.

But that's *my* personal and professional relationship with him, and there are a whole bunch of people out there who have read his work who share the same admiration I feel. And with good reason.

I think it's fair to say that, in many ways, Tim saved — or at least hugely rejuvenated a largely moribund — *Star Wars* franchise. His Thrawn novels are deep in the DNA of the *Star Wars* community, and the way in which they were ignored in the last movie trilogy had a lot to do (in my personal opinion) with how disappointed quite a lot of that community was in where the movies went. And the fact that according to John Favreau Tim has a consulting role in *Ahsoka*'s plans to bring Thrawn into the series is what they call a Good ThingTM.

His *Star Wars* work would be more than sufficient laurels to rest upon if he really wanted to (and if he showed any particular interest in slowing down and resting). But then there's the Blackcollar trilogy, the Cobra trilogies (yes, there are three *trilogies*, not just three novels), the Conquerors trilogy, the Icarus series, the Dragonback series, two really good Terminator novels, the Quadrail series, the Sibyl's War series, the aforementioned Manticore Ascendant series, and God only knows how many other solo novels scattered about. Oh, and over fifty short stories that I'm aware of. I suspect there are others lurking in the underbrush somewhere, waiting to spring out and captivate the unwary reader who strays into range.

The man is clearly an overachiever.

He is also one of the nicest, warmest human beings you will ever meet.

I am honored to call him a friend and proud to call him a collaborator, and I would tell the LibertyCon community how very fortunate we are to have him as a guest this year, if I didn't already know that everyone reading this program book already knows that.

David Weber

"With more than eight million copies of his books in print and 33 titles on the *New York Times* bestseller list, David Weber is a science fiction powerhouse. In the vastly popular Honor Harrington series, the spirit of C.S. Forester's Horatio Hornblower and Patrick O'Brian's *Master and Commander* live on—into the galactic future. Books in the Honor Harrington and Honorverse series have appeared on 21 bestseller lists, including *The Wall Street Journal, The New York Times*, and *USA Today*."



But you probably knew that part already.

Like many others, I first met David through his writing. For me, it started with the Starfire books (I do love me some exploding spaceships) and then progressed on through the Honorverse—which is, in my humble opinion, the best-constructed science fiction setting in history.

Not currently being written. Not within a particular subgenre. Ever.

Agree or disagree with that statement, it's hard to deny the Honorverse is something special, a setting and a cast of characters that opens a unique playground in our minds, one that doesn't come along very often. David's written a lot of great books, but it's safe to say the Honorverse is what he's best known for.

But what about the man himself? What's he like?

To me, David is a great friend, an exceptional coauthor, and the best writing mentor I could have ever hoped for. He's also one of the smartest—and more critically, one of the *wisest*—people I have ever known, and that's not a statement I make lightly.

I first met David at a small convention in Greenville, South Carolina where he was handing out free copies of *On Basilisk Station*. I'd brought my dogeared paperback of *In Death Ground* in the hopes of having it signed, and when I plopped it on the table, David let out a surprised "Whoa!" at the ragged state of the book.

Afterward, my wife and I sat down with Sharon Rice-Weber (or, more accurately, were unwillingly corralled by the TRMN because we did *not* want to bother David's wife!) and she later invited us to meet them for lunch. One thing led to another, and soon the four of us became fast friends.

Skip forward several years, and the four of us were celebrating my wife's birthday. I asked David if he'd be willing to read through a recently rejected manuscript of mine and let me know where he felt I needed to improve. He said yes, but then as dinner progressed his expression changed, became... somewhat mischievous.

That's when he suggested we write a novel together.

I was eventually able to sputter out a yes, but I bring this story up to illustrate a point: I went to David as a friend with a problem, and he decided to help me by giving me a nontrivial chunk of his professional time and energy!

That, right there, tells you all you need to know about what kind of person David Weber is.

The **Southern Fandom Confederation** (**SFC**) is a not-for-profit literary organization and information clearinghouse dedicated to the service of Southern science fiction and fantasy fandom. It focuses on science fiction and fantasy fans residing in the states of Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, and Virginia. It exists for the purpose of



promoting fan and professional activity within that area. However, any fan from anywhere is welcome. The **SFC** has been and always shall be a non-discriminatory organization.

SFC was founded in 1969 at the **DeepSouthCon** in Knoxville, Tennessee. 

Tech Tips for Authors

I like sharing tech tips with my friends just as much as I like fixing websites. Here are a few tricks I've learned over the years. - Nate

Screen Sizes Matter

Never evaluate a design or proofread text on a smartphone. It doesn't matter whether you are checking a new logo, a print layout, or an illustration, a smartphone's screen is simply too small to properly evaluate the content.

Contact Forms

I know you have a contact form on your site, but does your site also log the messages sent through the form? A recent discussion in my FB group The Help Desk reminded me that emails sometimes go astray. This is why I make sure that the sites I build use a contact form that logs all submissions.

Backups

Backups are the foundation of all website security and maintenance. If your website is backed up regularly, you can use it to undo whatever accident just caused your site to crash. And if your site gets hacked, there's a good chance you will have a backup from before the hack, saving you some of the time and energy required to de-hack the site.

eBook Formatting

This breaks with print formatting rules, but when you use an ellipsis or m-dash in your ebook, you _really_ need to add a space both before and after. Some reading apps will treat...this as one long word. Trust me, this can do terrible things to the ebook's formatting.

Spam

Spammers are going to flood your site with their trash, trust me on that. Luckily, you can use the **Cleantalk** Wordpress plugin to automatically keep spam comments from ever being seen by legitimate visitors. It even kblocks spam in your contact forms!

Internet Archive

If you've ever discovered a post or page was mysteriously deleted from your site, and wanted to get that one post back without restoring your entire site from a backup, I may have a solution. The Internet Archive regularly scans and backs up most websites, and if you are lucky it will have a copy of your missing page or post.




