

WELCONE TO LIBERTYCONS

Welcome to LibertyCon8 and a new beginning. This is our first year at the East Ridge Days Inn and Convention Center and we are very excited about the move. We have tons more function space than last year, and the room rates are \$13 less than at the Comfort Hotel. Most importantly, the Days Inn really wants our business. To borrow a phrase from one of my favorite movies, "This could be the start of a beautiful friendship."

The management of the Days Inn has asked LibertyCon attendees to PLEASE NOT CONGREGATE IN THE HOTEL LOBBY. That ain't no biggie, we have THREE different alternatives. FIRST, the Hotel Management has rented a truck-load of comfortable couches to put in the Convention Center foyer. SECOND, in the Gathering Spot, we have a CARD AND QUIET CONVERSATION ROOM that is open 24 hours a day. Now add LibertyCon's Heroes and Villains Theme Banquet and the Masquerade, and I think that you will see that you will be kept amused for the weekend.

This year's Literary Guest of Honor is F. M. "Buz" Busby. Buz is a hard science fiction writer (as well as an Electrical Engineer in real life) whose many works of fiction have entertained and delighted us over the years. Our Artist Guest of Honor is Doug Chaffee, who is one of the finest artists in the country and whose astronomical paintings alone have started many a fan on fantastic mind trips to the stars (I tried to wax poetic, but it didn't work). Frank Kelly Freas and Laura Freas are our Special Guests. If any of you out there have ever read a Science Fiction Book, you have seen a Kelly Freas cover. His lovely wife, Laura, has become a very good artist in her own right. This year, the part of our Permanent Master of Ceremonies, Mr. Wilson "Bob" Tucker will be played by Mr. Brad Strickland. Brad has very Smooocothly stepped in to pinch hit. Thanks Brad; Get well soon, Granddad.

Now, it's time to tell you about the really important people behind LibertyCon, my STAFF! They are the Best. Hach and every one of them pave their own way to LibertyCone each year and even pays the same price for a membership as you. It's my job to abuse them unmercifully, it is your job to praise them unmercifully. I'll do my job and I expect you to do yours. LIBERTYCON 8 RULES

ATTENDEES 17 YEARS OLD AND UNDER: All convention attendees who are 17 years of age or younger must be accompanied by a LEGAL GUARDIAN. A Legal Guardian is a person 21 years of age or older who will take financial and legal responsibility for the minor and will sign for each minor person for which he/she is reponsible. Children under 7 must be accompanied by a parent or Legal Guardian at all times.

BADGES: Badges must be worn in plain sight above the waist at all times.

DRINKING AGE: To get a drinking badge, you must produce a VALID Military ID or Drivers License with your Picture on it to prove that you are at least 21 years of age. Minors caught drinking at LibertyCon will be hung, drawn, quartered, and thrown out of the convention. Also, WE WILL CONTACT YOUR PARENTS AND YOU WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO RETURN TO FUTURE LIBERTYCONS!

EJECTION FROM THE CONVENTION: If you are ejected from LibertyCon8 because of violations of the convention rules or Tennessee State Law, your attendance fees will not be refunded


LOST BADGE POLICY: If you lose your badge at the convention, you will have to purchase another one at the full purchase price of \$35. We are sorry to take this rough stand, but incidents of people (Not Fans) purchasing a replacement badge to give/sell to a friend at a reduced price only increases the cost of the convention for real fans and this is the only way we can curb it.

WEAPONS POLICY: All weapons and models of weapons must be "Peace Bonded" by one of our security staff before they may be worn with your costume or normal wearing apparel. This weapons policy will be strictly enforced!

BECAUSE WE CARE:

If you have a medical condition which you would like to make sure someone knows about in case of an emergency, please ask the registration staff for a sticker for the back of your badge. Should the need arise, LibertyCon staff members know to look there first for important information.

LIBERTYCON will place an ORANGE PUMPKIN on the convention registration table on Sunday as a collection point for badge clips. For each clip collected, LibertyCon will donate a dime to the J. Johnson Memorial Scholarship Fund.

BEING MARRIED TO BUZ By Elinor Busby

I was asked to tell you people what it's like to be married to F. M. Busby, even dissing him if it worked that way. If possible, I was to be funny, but everybody knows that's easier said than done. As I told my boss at work the next day, "I don't think I can be funny on purpose. I can be funny only by accident." She smiled sympathetically and moved away. Perhaps she has faith in me. Perhaps she doesn't care. Who knows?

When I married Buz forty years ago, I knew that he had always wanted to be a writer although he had become an electrical engineer instead. These things happen. In 1956 he decided to make a real attempt to get into the writing biz and actually sold a story. Then I got us seriously involved in fandom, and he forgot all about non-fannish writing for many years.

In 1970 the system he worked for was sold to private industry and Buz, along with several hundred other wonderful people, were riffed. This was the year that Boeing was laying off engineers, and a melancholy billboard asked, "Will the last person to leave Seattle please turn out the lights?"

"This is my chance to write, " he worried, "but can we live on my pension?" "We don't have to," I assured him. "I'll keep on working." "I'll give it six months," he said, (He says I said it, but he's mistaken.)

But you see, I redeemed myself from the error I made in getting us into fandom. I said I'd keep on working. I said we didn't have to go live in Fort Huachuca, where he could keep on being an engineer. I said if we stayed in Seattle, he didn't have to sell shoes. The noble Elinor promised to keep her job.

Buz started selling with reasonable promptitude, and has continued to sell. He is a pro of such renown that the good people in Chattanooga, Tennessee invited him to come and bring his wife. So you see right there, it's advantageous to be married to a professional writer.

And what are the disadvantages? Well--I'll tell you. When Buz and I were both fans we always had lots to talk about. We talked about other fans, and all the ins and outs of fandom. Conversation never flagged. Now, when I see Buz deep in thought, I don't speak to him. I know his head is in his book, and his concentration shouldn't be broken. This occasionally makes for some rather boring lunches. When he does speak, he tells me what is going on in his book, which is a little like hearing someone tell the plot to a movie, or rather, PART of the plot to a movie.

For a while there I wrote too, not entireley in self-

defense--Buz wasn't the only one with literary ambitions. I sold three short stories,* but with all three, the editors made it clear that I was married to F. M. Busby, which made me feel that my stories hadn't necessarily passed the Joe Glotz test. It all seemed a bit ersatz. So I tried a couple different genres and wrote heaps of stuff, but didn't sell a thing. Then I decided that at heart I was more an overall Beautiful Human Being than an actual writer, because writing is fun but (for me, at least) requires a lot of focusing, and the focused life rules out other interests that are equally amusing. Further, marketing is not fun and really does not meet my needs at this time.

The revered F. M. Busby does, however. Forty years! That's not too many.

"The stories I sold were "Time to Kill", published in Amazing during Ted White's editorship, "Third from the Sun" in Susan Wood's "A Room of Our Own", and "The Night of the Red, Red Moon" in Jessica Salmonson's "Tales by Moonlight".

As a child, I was never afraid of the monsters under the bed. I knew that was not where they lived. They were in my father's studio, along with my dolls' dismembered bodies - I learned to be very protective of my few intact ones - various skulls (including human), the duck wing (sans duck), the five or so bubbling gallons of homebrewed wine and, of course, the spaceport. Back then I didn't really know why everyone made such a fuss over "the spaceport". To me it was just a bother to dust and not much fun to play with either. I was a teenager when I finally realized what these stupid rocket ships meant, and that not too many people had one...let alone ten! Hugos they called them.

Kelly wasn't always like this. Sometimes he was strange, like the time he hung by his boots off the Vehicle Assembly Building at Cape Canaveral (boy, was his guide glad to get him down off the roof) because he said 'the view was better", or the time he went on a cruise with the <u>USS Lapon</u>, a nuclear submarine and happily sketched the entire ship. The Admiral still has some of the pictures that were confiscated. And conventions!!! What tales we could tell! But we won't, at least not here ask Walt sometime though (or Gordie or Aspirin or Offutt or a dozen others I won't name).

Since then he has continued to garner top awards for Science Fiction and Fantasy art, and - along with his wife Laura Brodian Kelly-Freas, an award winner in her own right - continues to be a strong presence in the field and an encouraging influence on new artists. We're all very glad, myself especially, that the western branch of the Freas clan could return East for the weekend.

William Bradley Strickland Our Toast Master for LibertyCon8 by Klon Newell

Brad Strickland and his family (wife, Barbara and two children, Jonathan and Amy) have been attending LibertyCon for a long time, so I am sure that most of you have already met them and have gotten Brad to autograph his books, magazines, etc. for you. Dr. Brad Strickland has had many pieces of scholarly work published during his years of experience as an "English Prof", hence I am going to leave that portion of his life to be written by the academicians of the future. I will concentrate only on his science fiction, fantasy, and mystery publications.

What do the following magazines have in common: Amazing Stories, Critical Mass, Ellery Queen's Mystery Magazine, Fantasy & Science Fiction, Infinity Cubed, Isaac Asimov's Science Fiction Magazine, Marion Zimmer Bradley's Fantasy Magazine, and Space Grits? Each magazine has a part of Brad Strickland's life in it in the form of a short story, novelette or a novella.

The earliest publication shown in Brad's Bibliography (given to me on May 15, 1984) is a short story which appeared in Ellery Queen's Mystery Magazine, September, 1966, titled "The Third Grave." The story that started Brad down the long path of science fiction and fantasy appeared in Isaac Asimov's Science Piction, May 1982, "Payment Deferred." The bio accompanying this story states: "The author is a native of Georgia, where he lives with wife and children, teaches and - increasingly - writes. His first works appeared in Ellery Queen's Magazine; this is his first SF sale."

The first sentence of "Payment Deferred" starts off . . .

"Mortally ill though he was, Lynak, Prime Elder Of Hara Gathering, lifted himself from his bed of cushions and forced his eight knees to extend." A lot of writers get embarassed when you mention their early stories and they will tell you of the changes they would like to make in it. Well, Brad, I like the story as it stands and it needs no changes!

A little known publication (as of today) that has published several of Brad's short stories is SPACE GRITS. These to me are classic Strickland and I am glad that I took the time to chase down copies of this magazine. The following is a list of Brad's stories in SPACE GRITS:





As Oboe reports, Crisco demands, "Why did you grant Quart he bar and grill and savings and loan concession?"

First bridling, by effort Oboe regains his approximation of man form. "Sir, I only followed your guidlines: to seek maxiim representation of cultural differences."

Losing face, never a pretty sight, Oboe says, "My mistake, .. I thought you said ethical diversity."

Most alien species present on the Station are recognizable various unsightly skin conditions, largely due to the rapacity Proctor & Gamble when it comes to licensing the offworld manuscture of Clearasil. Pejora, however, holds Most Favored condock status. The complexion of the Pejoran woman now entering, Major Gyro who acts as Crisco's liaison with the Pejorative visional Government, is marred only by the notches all down the ridge of her nose. These are believed either to hold religious gnificance or, since Pejoran beds are known to lack bedposts, constitute a record of sexual activity.

Obviously perturbed and well she might be, Gyro says, "Comnder, a Visacardassian warship is approaching Dock Port seveneven."

Visacardassians! For generations they occupied Pejora, lding its inhabitants in virtual slavery to exorbitant finance arges, enforcing their harsh rule by such Draconian measures as moving all premium services from the cable feeds of dissidents. even confiscating their remotes.

It is only a few years since the Fiddleration liberated

Pejora from the Visacardassian yoke, and the former oppressors cannot be trusted. Crisco becomes tense. Present tense, to be exact. "What do they want? Major, open me a channel."

"Which one, sir?"

"The Sunday Night Movie. And then during the commercials, maybe I should talk with that ship."

Jarnevon makes a face. "Him? A guy who wears flats with an evening gown? What does he know about anything?"

The trouble with crossdressing is, nobody takes you seriously. Not even when the doctor wears that darling little outfit from Fredericks of Romulus.

"The ship hasn't really left, " says Lieutenant Fax. "It just hangs out there near the Warmhole."

"Nothing so pedestrian," says the suddenly-appearing man lounging indolently on nothing at all. "If you're wondering about your gravity generator, my dear Crisco, it's mine now. Stowed away safely on my ship docked at ten-four, good buddy."

"QT! What -- ? How -- ?"

"A business transaction with the young Parouti, " says QT,

curling his lip and then spraying it with conditioner. "It seems he wishes to go into competition with his uncle Quart."

"But . . . what could you possibly trade him for it?"

"I'm afraid the lad sometimes misinterprets what he hears. He has given me the generator in exchange for two bars full of gold-tressed Latins. And a gallon of peroxide."

"I still don't understand, Oboe." Seated firmly in his chair, crisco pursues the matter. "Oh certainly, once aboard QT's ship you could shapeschlep so as to take the generator's place while o'Briny sneaked the real thing away, then be carried off your-self, disguised as yesterday's garbage. But how did you ever get on that ship in the first place?

In April, 1984, a story published in P&SF "The Herds Of Frimm" was a Nebula Nomination. This is also the year in which Grad's first novel TO STAND BENEATH THE SUN was finished. His new agent, Richard Curtis, really liked the manuscript and was almost sure he could sell it, which he did.

In 1992, Brad's first hardback book, DRAGON'S PLUNDER, appeared on the shelves of book stores. When the writer John selairs died, Dial Books For Young Readers asked Brad to step in and complete THE GHOST IN THE MIRROR (he wrote 11 out of the 13 chapters). In 1993, he wrote another John Bellair novel, THE ENGEANCE OF THE WITCH FINDER, thus adding two more hardbacks to is growing list of publications. Brad also has two books in the star Trek: Deep Space Nine series, \$1 THE STAR GHOST and \$2 TOWAWAYS.

Next year, I will have to add a new writer to the list of riters being invited to LibertyCon. Both Brad and Barbara trickland are presently completing a story for Star Trek The ext Generation: Starfleet Academy series. It might be called TARPALL. Barbara, we look forward to inviting you as a writer.

In closing, I must say that I always look forward to reading rad Strickland's (or Will Bradley's) next story.

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
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
