Welcome to the fourth annual Science Fiction and Fantasy Convention of Chattanooga, LIBERTYCON 4! This year we have tons of things planned to peak your interest for the entire weekend. With the Art Show and Art Auctions, up to five tracks of Programming, a large Huckster Room, Videos 24 hours a day, Dancing both Friday and Saturday Evenings, the Hospitality Suite (the Hotel Bar), a large Gaming Area with numerous tournaments (both card games and war games), a super Masquerade, and workshops in Writing, Miniature Painting, Art and Costuming, we hope to keep you entertained and amused for the weekend.

Those of you who have never before attended LibertyCon, might ask where all of these activities are taking place. I'll tell you. LIBERTYCON 4 RULES

ATTENDEES 17 YEARS OLD OR YOUNGER

All attendees of this convention who are 17 years of age or younger must be accompanied by a LEGAL GUARDIAN. A Legal Guardian is a person 21 years of age or older who is willing to take financial and legal responsibility for the minor. The person acting as the Legal Guardian will be required to sign for each minor for whom he/she is responsible.

BADGES

You must wear your stinking badge at all times at the convention. Badges must be worn in plain sight and above the waist. 'Nuff said on the subject.

DRINKING AGE

To get a drinking badge, you must produce a VALID PICTURE ID to prove that you are at least 21 years of age. Minors caught drinking at LibertyCon will be hung, quartered, and thrown out of the convention. Also, WE WILL TELL YOUR PARENTS AND YOU WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO RETURN TO FUTURE LIBERTY CONS! The legal drinking age in Tennessee is 21 and the Chattanooga Police take great pleasure in enforcing it. Please don't look to me for sympathy because our lovely registrar (my wife, Linda) made me show her my ID to get my badge, and I'm the Chairman!

EJECTION FROM THE CONVENTION

If you are ejected from LibertyCon 4 because of violations of the rules of this convention or Tennessee State Law, your attendance fees will not be refunded.

LOST BADGE POLICY

If you loose your badge at the convention, you will have to purchase another one at the full purchase price of \$35. We are sorry to take this rough stand on this matter, but there have been reported incidents of people (Not Fans) who will purchase a replacement badge to give/sell to a friend at a reduced price. This type of behavior only increases the cost of the convention for the real fans and this is the only way we can curb it.


WEAPONS POLICY

When humanity first ventured out among the stars, it seemed that we were alone in the universe; while life was common, intelligent life was rare. Indeed, we seemed to be the only tool-users in the galaxy-- and thus were free to mold the very cosmos to our hearts desire. It was our Manifest Destiny...and besides, there was no one to stop us.

Then we met the Tampies. The Tampies held all life to be part of a single pattern and themselves its guardian; to harm the slightest part of it was to harm the whole. It was inevitable that such a species ethic would bring its holder into conflict with Man. Unfortunately for us, the Tampies' living spaceships were much better than our metal ones. The Tampies had Warhorses...

BAEN ABBOOKS

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He fled across the Canadian border (southbound, of course) on a bitterly cold winter day with wolves and polar bears snapping at his snowshoes. Born and raised in Canada, someone had told him that sunny, warm California was the place for a young writer to be. Someone said that while California may have a few wolves in and around Hollywood, polar bears were very scarce indeed.

A. E. Van Vogt fled south. He stayed south.

Van first discovered science fiction in <u>Chum</u>, a British boys' magazine. Knowing now what science fiction was, he kept an open eye for more of the fantastic stuff and was totally amazed when he discovered (at age 14) a copy of <u>Amazing Stories</u> on a Winnipeg newsstand in 1926. Like Jack Williamson before him (in a faraway place, New Mexico) Van became an eolithic science fiction fan in the older, truer sense. And like so many of us, he decided to write it as well as read and collect it. Which he did, publishing first in other genres, and then in the science fiction and fantasy magazines beginning with <u>Astounding Stories</u> in 1939.

He is credited with coining the term "fix-up novel" to describe the process of blending a series of short stories and novelettes into a single full-length novel. He coined the term "slan" as a title for his best-remembered book, a term that fandom seized on with glee. In 1941, a group of fans in Battle Creek, Michigan moved into a rented house and shared it on a communal basis; they named their house "Slan Shack" and since then other fans in other cities have dubbed their houses and apartments "Slan Shack"

Successful book followed successful book as Van's career blossomed after the publication of <u>SLAN</u>. Everyone has a list of favorite books written by A. E. Van Vogt, but some of the most popular include:

Van met, wooed and married Ms. Lydia in 1979. Ms. Lydia is a truly interesting lady who works in the Superior Court of Los Angeles as a transator. Austrian by birth, she is fluent in five different languages. As one of the driving forces in Van's life, Ms. Lydia encourages him to continue writing. He is now working on SLAN II which should be in print in the near future.

Artists have a reputation, whether deserved or not, for being a little bit unusual... maybe even a whole lot unusual (did anybody see an ear laying around here?). When you combine art with SF, a mundane would shudder to think of the possible consequences. I have the honor to be writing the program book bios for two such artists who belong to our happy community.

DEBBIE HUGHES & MARK MAXWELL

I have known Mark Maxwell since 1982 when he painted "Dreamstage", a painting which hangs over my bed to this day. Until then, I had dabbled in art (actually print) collection. That fateful weekend I became a "collector" A painting that had an immediate purchase price of \$150 somehow lured an otherwise reasonably sane person into spending \$210 for it - and I put the first bid on! Maxwell has had a financially disastrous effect on me ever since. Maxwell has since become one of the more successful Southern SF artists, at least he no longer survives on a diet of popcorn and porridge. Inclined toward "hard SF" scenes, he has become a featured artist in the space community (especially the L-5 society). Unfortunately for the collectors among us, with success comes higher prices for Mark's artwork. I would recommend wandering through the art show and examining Maxwell's work and maybe even digging down into your pocket! (Brother, can you spare a dime?) They'll be on the panels with all the blue ribbons attached.

For a long time Debbie Hughes, Maxwell's SO (significant other) was safe from my artistic interest. Those of you who have seen "Solid State", (The blue painting with the wires coming out of the girl's head, for those who don't remember titles.) will find that it is a truly chilling painting. Although my tastes do not run toward horror, Debbie's work has its admirers, as her many awards attest. I was able to tottle along buying the occaisonal Maxwell or Ward, quietly impoverishing myself, for several years. Alas? Fortunately? Debbie has moved in a direction more in tune with my tastes in recent years, so she's now beggaring me also! I'm now commissioning paintings from both Mark and Debbie, and it'll undoubtedly be my ruin yet. Look for Debbie's paintings next to Maxwell's. Debbie's paintings will be surrounded by ribbons too.

So both Mark and Debbie are well-known, successful Southern SF artists. They're both fairly easy to strike up a conversation with, especially if you buy their art. They're also both typical Bohemian artist types, with an SF twist. (That is to say, they have, uhhhh, interesting musical tastes, they live hand-to-mouth from one day to the next, they are very talented, and you really should buy some of their paintings/prints so that they won't starve.) And they're fine people, good friends, and members of Southern Fandom family. I have enjoyed knowing them over the past decade and look forward to the next. Ad astra per artem.

Debbie Hughes just finished her second cover for Baen Books. Her work was recently exhibited in New York at the Park Avenue Atrium and another show is planned for the fall of this year. Both events were sponsored by Olympia and York.

Mark Maxwell's work appears in <u>Visions of Space</u>; a book by David Hardy about space artists, published by Paper Tiger press. Look for more of his work to be released this fall by Workman Press in William K. Hartman's <u>Stream of Stars</u>. Mark is also currently working with NASA to illustrate a brochure on Space Lab 9 for the summer of '91.

Tim Zahn. The Man in Black. Pizza lover. Zorro fan. Secret Agent for U.N.C.L.E. Father of my child. Secret childhood desire: to be the tick-tock crocodile from Peter Pan. Capable of giving a complete rendition of Super Chicken's theme song. (Which may not be all that unique. I saw him do a duet with Nick Pollotta at a con dinner in Peoria. The dinner involved pizza, of course.)

Obligatory notes: 53 short stories (published, that is --- there are lots more written), 10 novels, 2 story collections, Hugo Award for the novella "Cascade Point" in 1984. Most recent novel: Warhorse, from Baen Books. Current work in progress: book one (of three) in a Lucasfilm-commissioned "Star Wars" series ("The Saga Continues"), from Bantam.

The personal stuff. Born in 1951, Tim grew up in Lombard, a western suburb of Chicago. Went to Michigan State and received a B.S. in physics in 1973. Then to the University of Illinois in Champaign-Urbana to work on a Ph.D. He picked up his M.S. in 1975, and was still striving toward a doctoral thesis when his advisor passed away in 1979. His thesis passed away shortly thereafter. Not interested in continuing his career as a professional student, he switched to another unlikely career: free-lance writing. (What else was he qualified for?) He also got married in 1979 and saw his first story, "Ernie", in print at the rehersal dinner, an accidental wedding present from Analog.

Tim began writing full-time in January of 1980, having by then sold two short stories. Tim has since become the father of an 8-year-old, Corwin Jame, received award nominations for his work, attended his first con (Denvention II in 1981), traded his typewriter in on a word processor, voted in the 1982, 1984, 1986, and 1988 elections...and started making a living writing. (He'll probably vote in 1990, too.)

A problem solver at heart, Tim tends to write stories dealing with people in situations where a problem really NEEDS to be solved. His characters are usually people you'd want to know. His story themes frequently involved the importance of people, and the importance of people growing and facing up to the world and its problems. But at the heart, it's got to be a good story because---as Tim often quotes Gilbert and Sullivan---"For he who'd make his fellow creatures wise/ Should always gild the philosophic pill."

His most recent novel, Warhorse, deals once again with space horses, creatures who had appeared twice before in Analog stories. The conflict involves humans and the Tampies, an alien race which has taken ecological sensitivity to the max. Their style of life and their quickness to express their opinion of how we style ours has resulted in interspecies tension. So, at the edge of conflict, this story rides with the humans in their adequate but slow starships and the Tampies with their superior living space drives.

Tim is a writer. He hides away in his small office, and there creates a story he hopes to share with us. He's often in a galaxy far, far away; but this weekend he's here in Chattanooga to share himself with us. So, I hope you get a chance to know him.

Whew! Well, I made it. (How many of YOU have tried writing a bio of your spouse?) Now you've made it through this maze of words also; but even though we're all readers here, we don't want to take this to extremes. It's time to con. Tim and I intend to enjoy Liberty Con to the fullest; we hope you'll join us.

It was probably about the time that I turned six or seven years old when I realized that our household was not typical of others in the neighborhood.

LIFE WITH THE 'UN-REAL " BOB TUCKER

Most homes in Bloomington, Illinois had one husband, one wife, two or three children, two radios and either a cat or a dog. We had the two children, two radios and a dog but all similarity to the average household ended there. My Father, Sister, Aunt, Uncle and myself lived together. This in itself doesn't actually sound like there was a big difference, but when you merge the two distinct personalities of Pop and my Aunt, it became a real fun place to

Pop was a "Science Fiction Fan", and was writing before I was born. He broke away from writing science fiction in the late forties to write five mysteries. The biggest reason for this temporary switch was that they were selling a lot better than SF. One of these five, The Chinese Doll, went over so well that he is still receiving royalties on it, even though its copyright date is 1946. However, by the early fifties, because:

(A) His heart was truly into writing Science Fiction,

(B) He had cracked the big-name mystery market and felt he could do the same with SF.

(C) Detective stories weren't selling as well as they once did,

(D) All of the above.

Whatever the reason, he wrote City in the Sea, the first of a whole gob of Science Fiction Novels. However, this is getting away from the main point of the story.

Even though he was writing and selling detective stories, he kept up with fandom, conventions, parties, Beams Choice Bourbon, women and cheap cigars. As a result of this, he had friends and Fans from all over the world.

My Aunt's and Uncle's idea of an exceptionally great, "whoopee" time was sitting in the living room listening to "Gang Busters" or maybe having an ice-cream cone once a week. To say that they were conservative is like calling the Pope a mildly religious man.

Bloomington, Illinois was a main switching point between Chicago and St. Louis. Most of the trains going to Los Angeles from New York would pass through the town. In addition, it was right on Route 66, the main east-west highway at the time. Quite often fans would show up on our front porch. Some fans (and other writers) had a tendency to wear some odd articles of clothing, such as propeller beanies or big buttons that said something totally impossible such as "Moon or Bust". At this point, my Aunt would start running from door to door in the neighborhood screaming "Those weird people are my Brother's friends, not mine!" Upon returning to the house, she would promptly lock herself in her bedroom.

While my Aunt sulked and my Uncle sneered, Pop had to tactfully inform his guests that they couldn't stay. The sad part of it was that Pop would probably have enjoyed the visit. I can only remember two friends/writers, Bob Bloch and Frank Robinson, that were tolerated.

After the Fans left, my Aunt would emerge from the bedroom and request that Pop do something to discourage those strange people from dropping in. Quit writing that silly Science Fiction stuff and go back to writing sensible things was often the suggestion. What would the neighbors think if they found out what he was writing?

I don't know if he ever considered quitting writing about his favorite subject. I don't remember ever waking up in the middle of the night without hearing him typing. Judging by the sales of his books, there is a whole slew of people besides myself glad that he didn't take my Aunt's advice.

J. J. JOHNSON A REMEMBRANCE

There is an emptiness at Liberty Con this year, an emptiness that will never again be filled with a gentle bear hug, a hearty laugh, a clasp on the back. No more will be heard the familiar "Hey, how're you doing?" and "Tell me what you've been up to!" These things have been torn from us by a violent act all the more incomprehensible for its happening to such a gentle person.

That J.J. should die the victim of a robbery would seem to be a sick joke, for anyone who knew him also knew that anyone needing help would get it. If someone were in trouble, he always seemed to be the first to pitch in with time, effort or money. And if it was a time where he found himself unable to help due to his own circumstances, or the distance involved, he found somebody who could.

Nor was his greeting simple politeness. J.J. genuinely wanted to know how you were and what you were doing, in detail. He wanted to celebrate your triumphs with you, and provide a steady support for those other times. Despite his own situation, for his parent's health was a constant source of concern to him, he always had room for caring about others. From my sister, to a local author's mother; he enquired, listened, counseled when asked, and consoled when needed.

Energy did not seem to be a problem to him. He worked full time, cared for his parents, had some book and video deals underway, and pitched in at any convention that needed his help. I can think of at least one convention where he ran a video room out of his own pocket because they were short.

J.J. pitched in on Liberty from the start, promoting it, providing assistance, videotaping events, providing entertainment at the dances and in the consuite. Once again, if anyone or any area needed or wanted help, he was there. His love of Liberty wasn't even dimmed by being the victim of one of the few problems at any Liberty — the theft of his wallet. Being family, J.J.'s money was immediately replaced by friends; one of the few times I know of where he was the one being helped.

His was a familiar sight: talking in the lobby, catching up with a friend in the consuite, rubbing a young lady's back or feet, and dancing the night away on Friday and Saturday nights. It never seemed possible that he did all this despite videotaping the masquerade, helping with videos, sitting in on panels, and helping out wherever needed.

What this gentle man would have become is something that will never be known. As he cared about people, he cared about learning, having a sponge for a mind. He was always looking at new ideas, things, and areas of study. In his own profession, videography, he would constantly study techniques and advances in equipment. He was particularly impressed with CNN, visiting on several occasions, observing, learning, and discussing ideas for some new science fiction related shows. I suspect that somewhere in the back of his mind he planned his own media empire, one which could challenge Turner. J.J. would have tried in time, I'm convinced. With Turner's resources and successes it would not have been an even fight -- Turner would have lost.

I'm not sure how many years I knew J.J., for it seems I'd known him all my life; a friend, confidant, boon companion -- a brother who just hadn't been born a part of my immediate family. His memory is now a treasure to those who were fortunate enough to know him, and to his spirit, I bid Peace.

family. Most of you have a number of fond memories of Bob Adams, but I would like to share some of mine with you. Not only was Bob the Literary Guest of Honor at LibertyCon 3, he was also one of the chief inspirations behind the founding of LibertyCon. During one of the most trying times of my life, Bob was there, encouraging me to start LibertyCon to keep me active and involved with fandom. The rest is history. Another thing I remember about Bob was the evening phone calls when we would talk about Southern gossip concerning fans and pros and major happenings in the fandom community all over the world. I never left one of these gossip sessions without feeling humor and love for the man on the other end of the line.

Bob's sense of humor was a legend around the convention circuit, and he enjoyed playing not so subtle practical jokes. He got me by making me a character in his <u>Castaways in Time</u> series. Bob used to take great pleasure in describing this character to me as an Italian Barbarian Duke who was heavily into rape, pillage, plunder and burning, but who always got the order of the actions mixed up. I would always laugh, because of the twinkle in his eye when he would say it. He was always coming up with some of the most terrible jokes you could imagine, but I would always laugh because of that twinkle in his eyes as he told them.

Unlike many people involved with SF conventions, I was able to visit his home in Apopka, Florida. That is where I met his lovely mother. To this day, I can not remember Mrs. Adams first name, because I got into the habit of calling her "Mom". It just felt natural! Whenever I visited Bob, Pam and Mom in their home, I always got a very special feeling of warmth and love.

One of the highlights of my year was going to WorldCon and escaping at night after the blair of the parties into Bob's and Pam's room for some quiet time. Some of the parties there turned out to be as noisy as some of the open parties, but that was OK because you always knew that you were safe with family. One thing I remember about their WorldCon parties was all of the interesting people I got to meet. Two of my favorites were Ms. Catherine and Mr. Sprague (L. Sprague and Catherine CrookdeCamp). It was through Bob's direct influence that these two became the Guests of Honor at LibertyCon 1. We could have had no finer guests for the maiden voyage of LibertyCon than the deCamps, and for this, I will always owe Bob.

Those of you who really know me know about my relationship with Bob. I have always called him a grizzly teddy bear because underneath his gruff exterior was the heart and soul of a caring and loving individual. I lost both of my parents when I was twenty years old and I kind of adopted Bob as the father-figure in my life in recent years.

Bob was 56 years old when he left this world. Fifty-six years was not a long time to be on this earth. He is survived by his gracious mother, his sister Lou, and his loving wife, Pam. Bob is also survived by countless friends all over the world who will grieve his passing. Some people say that you can tell how a man has lived by the number of friends he leaves behind. In Bob's case, I guess you could say that he was one of the best, because he has left thousands of friends behind. Robert Adams, writer, loving husband, devoted son, and friend.
