LIBERTYCON7RULES

ATTENDEES 17 YEARS OLD OR YOUNGER: All attendees of this convention who are 17 years of age or younger must be accompanied by a LEGAL GUARDIAN. A Legal Guardian is a person 21 years of age or older who is willing to take financial and legal responsibility for the minor. The person acting as the Legal Guardian will be required to sign for each minor person for which he/she is responsible. Children under 7 must be accompanied by a parent or Legal Guardian at all times.

BADGES: Badges must be worn in plain sight and above the waist at all times. 'Nuff said.

DRINKING AGE: To get a drinking badge, you must produce a VALID Military ID or Drivers License with your PICTURE on it to prove that you are at least 21 years of age. Minors caught drinking at Liberty Con will be hung, drawn, quartered, and thrown out of the convention. Also, WE WILL TELL YOUR PARENTS AND YOU WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO RETURN TO FUTURE LIBERTY-CONS!

EJECTION FROM THE CONVENTION: If you are ejected from LibertyCon 7 because of violations of the convention rules or Tennessee State Law, your attendance fees will not be refunded.

LOST BADGE POLICY: If you lose your badge at the convention, you will have to purchase another one at the full purchase price of \$35. We are sorry to take this rough stand, but there have been reported incidents of people (Not Fans) who will purchase a replacement badge to give/sell to a friend at a reduced price. This type of behavior only increases the cost of the convention for the real fans and this is the only way we can curb it.

WEAPONS POLICY: All weapons and models of weapons must be "Peace Bonded" by one of our security staff before it can be worn with your costume or normal wearing apparel. This weapons policy will be strictly enforced!

BECAUSE WE CARE:

If you have a medical condition which you would like to mare sure someone knows about in case of and emergency, please feel free to ask the registration staff for a sticker for the back of your badge. Should the need arise, all LiberyCon staff members know to look there first for important information.

The first time I saw John Roberts was when he eased himself into an empty desk behind me during a class in the "History of the English Language" at the University of New Mexico. I had left my book at home and he extended his so that I could share it and proceeded to whisper, into my captive ear, puns and skewed Latin misinterpretations of various Indo-European nouns and verbs. I was amused and intrigued: anyone can flirt but literately?...in Old English, yet!! The next day I walked into my Writing class and encountered him across the table from me. He read a short story based on his Vietnam experience entitled "The War of the Roses" and I discovered that he not only talked a good game but also wrote in a style that combined humor with compassion. I liked his writing and thought I would like him.


He was studying anthropology, history, literature. He as a fencer, formerly president of the fencing club at UNM. I was studying theology, ethnology and English folklore and managing a coffee house for the Canterbury Center campus. When I told him that singing was one of the necessary arts of living as far as I was concerned, (that I could never marry anyone who did not sing, for instance), he surprised me on our next date with a serenade: the song was "The First Time Ever I Saw Your Face". I was beginning to like him.


We made it official in the spring of 1973, in a big open wedding at the Alumni Chapel at UNM. It was built in medieval Spanish style, and we had a medieval, SCA-style wedding with eighty persons in costume, Musica Antiqua minstrels, an all-night reception with belly dancers, priests, brewers of mead, family, friends, well-wishers (and some we never did identify) all joining in to make that St. George's Day an unforgettable experience. We left to live in Scotland with my daughter, Alayne. John started writing a historical novel. Alayne and I read each day's output as it came out of the typewriter, and, when he tired of it, we locked him in until he obliged with more of the story. All in the name of Art, of course.

When he became genuinely stalled (he found out nothing happened in the year 1350, which left his hero in limbo) and moped about it, I suggested he start a science fiction book: after all, that's what he was always reading! That book was The Strayed Sheep of Charun, which was bought by the first publisher he submitted it to: Doubleday. And, on the strength of that, Eleanor Wood, Heinlein's agent, wrote to ask if she could represent him. That lovely lady has been doing just that (and has become, as well, a dear friend) for the last sixteen years. And, as they (and Art) say, the rest is history. Or, rather, 34 books, some of which are history, some science fiction, adventure, and lately, mysteries.

Between 1971, when we met, and now, 1993, we have lived in New Mexico, Scotland, England, Mexico, California, and our present - and permanent home in my beloved Virginia mountains. We started the Lorica Center for Mountain Life in Pound, Virginia, my hometown. This is a library and community center for our small, rural Appalachian area. We also organized and sponsor Lorica, Unlimited, a sewing cooperative of women who make costumes at home to augment, or, in some cases, provide - their income while tending to their family's needs. John does a lot of talks and readings for local schools and colleges. He directs a continuing writer's roundtable for people who have something to say and need encouragement from one has made it. He teaches local kids to fence and make chainmail and mystify their parents.

We still sing a lot. And my first impression was right: I do like him, still and always - very much. I think John Roberts is one heck of a guy. And I wouldn't kid you - or Art, but John would - in Old English, yet.


