



MAIN FLOOR PLAN . LOBBY AND FUNCTION ROOMS





Welcome to the third annual Science Fiction and Fantasy Convention of Chattanooga, LIBERTYCON 3! This year we have tons of things planned to amuse and entertain you for the weekend. Among the things to look forward to are: the Art Show and Art Auctions, 3 tracks of Programming, Huckster Room, 24 hour Videos, Friday and Saturday night Dances, the Hospitality Suite (in the Hotel Bar), large Gaming Area with numerous tournaments (both war and card games), a super Masquerade, and workshops in Miniature Painting, Art, and Costuming. Are you interested yet? Well, there's plenty more going on at LibertyCon, but I think y'all will find out about it on your own.

For those of you who have never attended LibertyCon, you may ask where all of these activities are taking place. Well, I'll tell you. All of the functions at LibertyCon this year will be held on Floors 1 and A. It's obvious where Floor 1 is, but where is Floor A? Floor A is just below the lobby area and can be reached by the elevators or by a number of different stairways. Please see the maps at the end of this Program Book to get your bearings.

Another thing about the hotel is that they will be running reasonably priced buffets for the entire weekend in the

dining room so y'all can eat fast and get back to the festivities. Another tidbit that you might find of interest is the 2:00 pm checkout time on Sunday. The last thing I'll say is that the hotel staff is very unusual in that they really do like SF Fans. So please try to be nice to them because we don't want to blow a good thing.

This year LibertyCon is holding two different types of fund raising activities. The first is that you can have your name badge calligraphied for a \$1 donation to the Muscular Dystrophy Association. The second fund raising activity is the Hospitalization Auction that is being held before the normal Art Auction. LibertyCon had originally planned to support MDA with this function but something has happened that really hit home.

Robert Adams, our Literary Guest of Honor, is in the midst of a very grave illness and his hospital bills have been enormous. This Hospitalization Auction is LibertyCon's way of showing Bob how much we care. So, please be generous with both causes.

I have ended this welcome to you in the same way for two years now and we all know in fandom that once is an event but twice is a tradition. Who am I to buck tradition? LibertyCon is a convention that has been planned by fans, financed by fans, and is being put on by fans for fans. This is your convention and we want to know what we can do to improve it next year. To help improve the convention for next year, please attend the closing ceremonies entitled, "Let's Bitch at Uncle Timmy!" Give us your input to make LibertyCon 4 better than I think LibertyCon 3 will be.

WEAPONS POLICY

All weapons and models of weapons must be "Peace Bonded" by one of our security statt before it can be worn with your costume or normal apparel. The legal drinking age in Tennessee is 21 and the Chattanooga Police take great pleasure in enforcing it. Please don't look to me for sympathy because our lovely registrar (my wife Linda) made me show her my ID to get my badge and I'm the Chairman.

BADGES

You must wear your stinking badge at all times during the convention. Badges must be worn in plain sight and above the waist. 'Nuff said on the subject.

LOST BADGE POLICY

If you lose your badge at the convention, you will have to purchase another one at the full purchase price of \$25. We are sorry to take this rough stand on the matter, but there have been reported incidents of people (Not Fans) who have

purchased a replacement badge to give/ sell to a friend at a reduced price. This type of behavior only increases the cost of the convention for the real fans and this is the only way we can curb it.



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ROBERT AND PAMELA ADAMS

Since Bob is the elder of the two, we will start with him. Bob is a native Virginian that has been transplanted to Apopka, Florida, where he lives with his lovely wife, Pam, his mother, who is a sweetheart, and a number of dogs and cats. The best way to describe Robert

"Horseclans" Adams is with a quote of his own. When Bob is asked why he started writing S.F., he will give you his stock answer: "Well, you see, I'm too lazy to work for a living and too nervous to steal. So, what else could I do?" That quote is typical of Bob, his humorous approach to life and his propensity for telling tall tales.

Bob's output of published works is truly amazing. From the almost 20 volumes of the "Horseclans", to the 5 volumes of "Castaways in Time", to his new series, "Stairway to Forever," this writer is a work-a-holic! But please do not confuse quantity with quality. Bob's work has quality stamped all over it. One of the Grand Masters of Writing, Andre Norton, said it best. "Robert has the gift of sweeping headlong into breathless action, still his people are not actors one views from a safe distance. No, one rides within their skins, knows their troubles, their stinging defeats and uncertainties, relishes with them their victories....To possess the story teller's gift is a boon, to use it well is the result of stern discipline and hard effort." Robert Adams is this type of writer.

The love of Bob's life is his lovely wife, Pamela. Pamela Crippen-Adams is a native of Southern California who is an accomplished dog trainer as well as a editor of SF and Horror books. After they got married, Bob conned persuaded Pam

to assist him with a collection of short stories about the Horse-clans. Needless to say, while Bob was writing the main series, Pam was in charge of collecting short stories from other writers about the Horseclans. The results of her efforts was the Friends of the Horseclans. Since then, Pamela has gone on to co-edit a number of books with Bob and other writers. One of the latest projects she has completed is the book, Hunger for Horror, that was co-

edited with Bob and Martin H. Greenberg.

Both Bob and Pam have supported this convention since it's beginning as an idea in my twisted brain back in July of 1986. Both of them have been very supportive to the LibertyFen in the past few years and all of us want to thank them for being our Literary Guests of Honor at LibertyCon 3. At this point, I have to add a personal note. Some people are fortunate in life to meet a few good people who turn out to be true friends. I am one of the lucky ones in that I have had the good fortune to be blessed with the friendship of Robert and Pamela Adams.

BOB MAURUS - - THE UNTOLD STORY

Those remarkable sculpted items you find Bob Maurus, LibertyCon's Artist Guest of Honor, selling are so wonderfully detailed you might figure he never did any other kind of art. But he was a professional magazine illustrator, starting with the cover of Witchcraft & Sorcery #7 in 1972. He also illustrated stories in issue number 10. Furthermore, you should find some very recent examples of his drawing and painting in the LibertyCon Art Show and the cover of this program book.

If you hit the major conventions in this part of the southeast, you see Bob fairly often, and it isn't possible to see him more than once and not feel you know him. The blond, colorfully dressed, goodlooking bearded guy who will introduce you, under the proper social circumstances, to Jack. Jack being Yukon Jack, an apricot liqueur that becomes quite palatable once a little ice has been swirled around and melted in it. You find him in the Huckster Room or Art Show, selling his chalices and chess pieces and joking and chatting, so laid back he makes Uncle Timmy seem uptight. You know everything there is to know about him, right?

Of course not! And I intend to prove it to you.

To begin with, Bob was born in Brooklyn. He grew up in rural Massachusetts. He is married to Ginger Hewitt-Maurus and they have two daughters. He spent twelve years in the Air Force, and upon leaving the service he moved to Atlanta in 1971.



You've probably had a hint of this next revelation if you've passed his table in the Huckster Room and heard his tape player serving up the ripe poetry of Irish folk music. Bob is a singer of Irish folk songs who can be heard fairly frequently at one of Atlanta's better Irish pubs, as half of the immortal duo, Gilhooley and Schwartz. He and partner Chris Ricker are at work on their first album, "Gilhooley & Schwartz: Irish Cream."

He once worked for TSR, the D&D people, which entailed moving to Wisconson and designing gaming pieces. His exile didn't last long, but he doesn't feel it was a complete waste because he met some nice people and found a really good wine.

He's a published writer: his story, "The Stuff of Dreams", may be found in the Arkham House anthology, Nameless Places.

I've known Bob since he moved to Atlanta and we've had our share of adventures, arguments, discoveries, fun and Yukon Jack. If I had my way he'd be some sort of Guest of Honor at every convention he attended.

WILSON "BOB" TUCKER

Thousands upon thousands of words have been written about Wilson Tucker, the author. We would like to tell you about 'Bob' Tucker, fan, dear friend, all time great storyteller, and one of the Smo-o-othest gentlemen (Wink, Wink, Nudge, Nudge) in fandom.

We met Bob Tucker several years ago at our first convention. In those days we, like so many other fans, attended conventions on a wing and a prayer. For us and his other "granddaughters" and many fans of his acquaintance, Bob was always concerned. His main worry was that his "granddaughters" had a place to sleep. If not, he would gladly make an arrangement. Of course, he always told us, "You'll pay" (Wink, Wink, Nudge, Nudge). Which some of us did when he caught us "unawares".

In case you didn't know it, Bob Tucker is one of "The Time Masters": he bridges past, present, and future with his stories, both written and told. Sometimes true, sometimes just slightly exaggerated, his stories about early conventions, first fandom, and life in general are always presented with wit, warmth and charm.

For those of you who want to hear the truth (?) behind the "Rosebud story", or how he got the name "Bob", or why Rusty Hevelin is his "Dad", we give the following instructions: 1. Find a Room Party.

 Look for the largest gathering of happy lady fans. (A few token males will be sprinkled among them, trying to figure out how he does it.)

 Watch for a bottle of Beam's Choice being passed around and listen for the clarion call of "Smo-o-o-o-oth".

Tucker doing one of the things that he does best: entertaining fandom. We can't list in print all of the other things at which he is the best. Maybe, because you rabidly attend panels or parties, you have already heard the standard Tucker stories. If you have, there are also plenty of stories about:

His one and only Jacuzzi party.

Hotel bathtubs filled with lime green jello.

Granddaughters who hide his clothes and rearrange the furniture in his hotel room.

The Great River House Flood.

The moose on the hill across the lake.

And, the Yankee smugglers sneaking up the river in the dead of night.

This is just a sampling of many interesting, entertaining and sometimes embarrassing tales Bob has to tell. Sit down, get a swig of Beam's Choice (green label preferred), and enjoy the party. Just be warned, YOU may be the next subject of one of Bob's stories. (Wink, Wink, Nudge, Nudge!)

TOM DEE EE AYE TEE ZEE

Tom and I had met before, but the first time we really talked was in a swimming pool in Chattanooga. He told me he was working on a novel and, feeling proud of my status as a Published Writer, I offered to read a chapter of it. Little did I know.

Tom never showed me the manuscript. He is modest. But more important, he has more going on for him than he lets you know; his novel was already being considered for publication at the time. Plus Sharon Webb, a much more Published Writer than I, had already critiqued and encouraged Tom's work. But last of all, he did not let me know that he was--is--a Very Good Writer. I should have asked him to critique my work instead of vice versa.

Tom Deitz (note the spelling, please: DEE EE AYE TEE ZEE) was born in North Carolina through no fault of his own. Young Harris, Georgia, had no hospital way back then (Tom was born between the breaking of the sound barrier and the first manned orbital flight), and his mother had to make the trip north to bear him.

He grew up in Young Harris, a mountain town graced with a library and a fantastic view. In his youth, wanting to be a hippie but unable to be (there weren't any in Young Harris), Tom decided at least to read a book hippies were reputed to like: The Lord of the Rings. That set his course in life.

In college at Young Harris and later at the University of Georgia, Tom wavered between a career as an architect/ artist and a writer. He tried his hand at both art and the short story, and one of his short stories (about a werepossum) grew into the delightful Windmaster's Bane, the first novel about David Sullivan's adventures with the transplanted Sidhe. That was followed by Fireshaper's Doom and soon we will see Darkthunder's Way. But already out is a non-David book, The Gryphon King, which mirrors Tom's interests: Celtic lore, a Renaissance fair, neat cars, beautiful ladies, and Athens, Georgia. By the way, Tom's artistic gifts continue to serve him well; he has published illustrations and maps in many places and when he's not writing, Tom is Cartographer General for many area writers.

If you haven't encountered Tom's distinctive blend of humor, adventure, and wonder, buy his books and read them. If you haven't met Tom, walk up to him and say "Hi." And if you ever have a manuscript you'd like me to read, then forget it.

I've learned my lesson.

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

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MASQUERADE RULES

The Following information has been copied from the Masquerade Information Packet available at the Registration desk. Ignorance of these rules will be no excuse.

We are sorry to have to be so strict on our costumers, but something must be done about the few who insist on breaking the rules at the cost of others. In the past few years, masquerades have become the best attended functions at Southern Conventions. More and more people are participating as well. Where fans once displayed costumes just for fun, now we have a true competitive masquerade. Where ever people and competitions exist, there are rules, yet no one has tried to enforce the rules.

Gradually, as people bend the rules, problems begin to arise. While most masqueraders are considerate of others, some are not. Some deliberately ignore time limits. Some costumers wish to surprise or shock the audience with foul language or nudity. While these things do stimulate interest, they may offend members of the audience and judges. Complaints have even been made against contestants with messy make-up smudging or dripping on other people's costumes, or costume parts such as wings, horns and swords that stab and trip the other contestants or damage their costumes.

There have even been complaints of contestants endangering the audience by throwing things off the stage and stage fights using inferior quality weapons that could break under the stress. No one objects to tossing out things like confetti and candy. These things may be messy, but would not injure anyone if they were struck. However, glitter or confetti left on the stage could cause the next contestant to slip. Stage fights are exciting, but you do not need to forcefully clash swords to get the full effect. Clanging sounds can be dubbed onto a tape or provided by an assistant striking a pan backstage. SCA approved battle weapons may be used if force is needed.

Another rising problem comes in the form of time! Some costumers simply do not think it necessary to be on time or stand in line. This not only causes confusion, but it slows down the show. The wait is long enough when everything goes right, but when some contestants stay onstage forever or are not ready when their number is called, that is an unnecessary delay for everyone. If there is an unforseen problem that causes a delay, that contestant will be moved to the end of the line.

At LibertyCon no contestant may accede 90 seconds on stage or be in more than two presentations. If a contestant can produce more than one costume, then they have the right to show them. We do not feel that this gives unfair advantage, but it is unfair to make others wait for costume changes. Any costumer who wishes to employ another person to act as a model for another costume is encouraged to do so.

Since most of these rules are commonly applied, though often ignored, we feel that it is necessary to find a way to enforce them. It is truly unfortunate that the masquerade staff should have to act as security instead of trusting our contestants to be ladies and gentlemen. Unfortunately, the only measure that we can take is to disqualify any entry that does not comply to the rules. If a contestant is guilty of willfully or neglectfully harming another person or their costume, they will be asked to leave the staging area, as well as being disqualified. If an offense is meant to defy these rules, that contestant will be banned from participating in any future LibertyCon masquerade until such time as restitution can be made.

Disqualifying offenses:

- Going over the time limit.
- Participating in more than two presentations (All acts will be disqualified).
- Not being in your proper place at the proper time or following instructions of the staff.
- Damaging another costume intentionally or through neglect.
- Allowing harmful objects to leave the stage, including bouncing.
- Leaving harmful, messy or slippery things on stage without prior arrangement for cleanup.
- Unnecessary violence, language or nudity.

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
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
